

## Officials and residents resolve Lane 14 sewer line issues

WORLAND — Several residents of Lane 14 met at the County Commissioners meeting yesterday and discussed the outfall sewer line project and resolved concerns that will allow digging to begin on Monday.

“The main question was could the right of way on the north side of the track line be narrowed in there somewhere,” said chairman Terry Wolf. “I think we can go 25 feet on each side of the track line.

“I think we can make that work,” he said.

“The right of way could be adjusted on the north side of the track line from 30 feet to 25 feet on each side,” Wolf said.

According to Wolf, they would like to eliminate the mailboxes on the south side of the road and replace them with a group of boxes in one or two spots. He said that everyone would have their own key to their own mailbox.

“They are a safety hazard for one and there won’t be any space to maneuver,” Wolf said on the mailboxes being on the south side.

“We want to move them to the north side,” he said.

“The postmaster said those boxes are a lot more secure than the ones you got now,” said Bruce Frederick, County Planner/Surveyor.

“The south side just isn’t a feasible spot there to widen that road,” said Wolf.

Lane 14 resident Dave Newton asked if they would have to purchase those mailboxes.

Frederick said the county would purchase the mailboxes and install them.

“Are the tap outlets placed in order as of now?” asked Newton.

“That’s up to the property owner where they want them at,” said Gary Gerber, with the City of Worland. “Our operator will get with you as he approaches your property and find out where you want it at and have you put a stake in the ground as to where you want it.

“We got to get started Monday one way or another,” said Gerber.

According to Gerber they should be starting eight a.m. on Monday and that they will advertise that the road will be closed on one end for at least one day.

Frederick re-wrote the agreement for the residents of Lane 14 to sign.

The project, partially funded by a 50/50 match SLIB grant, is running an 8-inch sewer line heading into Worland.
